Special Opportunity for Foundation Leaders and Trustees: The Stories Leaders Must Tell, with keynote speaker Andy Goodman

"People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care." To lead, persuade and motivate in general, you must share what you believe in, what values have guided your actions and choices, why you have chosen the particular path you're on (and, presumably, want others to follow.) Marshall Ganz, a lecturer in public policy at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard, calls this form of public speech the "Story of Self." In this session, Andy Goodman will familiarize you with Ganz's powerful model, show examples of leaders sharing this story, and provide a tool to help you identify, develop and share your own Story of Self.
