









Emergency Management is a Team Effort

Emergency Management...

Standardizes and Coordinates Preparedness, Planning, Response, and Mitigation Activities







- Unified Command at the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC)
 - Governor and Lieutenant Governor
 - State Agency Commissioners/Division Heads/SEOC Liaisons
 - Also at DESPP--State Emergency Management Director
 - Private Sector Subject Matter Experts/Leaders
 - Federal Partners



Emergency Support Functions (ESFs)



Under the National Response Framework, federal resources are grouped under emergency support functions. In Connecticut, the 5 DEMHS regions have organized regional emergency support functions, to coordinate planning and response activities, as well as mutual aid. At the state level, federal, state, and non-governmental entities are also organized into ESFs.

- ESF 1: Transportation
- ESF 2: Communications
- ESF 3: Public Works
- ESF 4: Fire
- ESF 5: Emergency Management
- ESF 6: Mass Care
- ESF 7: Resource Support/Sector
- ESF 8: Public Health

- ESF 9: Search and Rescue
- ESF 10: Hazardous Materials Response
 - ESF 11: Agriculture and Natural Resources
 - ESF 12: Energy
- ESF 13: Law Enforcement/ Homeland Security
- ESF 14: Long Term Recovery and Mitigation
- ESF 15: External Affairs



Emergency Support Functions (ESF) 14 Subgroup on Recovery/Immediate Needs



- David Lehman, Commissioner of Economic and Community Development (DECD) is Chair of ESF 14, Long-Term Recovery
- Recovery/Immediate Needs Subgroup under ESF 14
 - Lisa Tepper Bates, Office of the Governor, Chair
 - **Goal:** to work together with a broad range of stakeholders to identify unmet needs; coordinate with all partners to work together to fill gap
 - Subgroup will serve as a point of connection between the state emergency management structure and philanthropic efforts including 4CT and other partners, in tandem with efforts of CCP



Emergency Support Functions (ESF) 14 Subgroup on Recovery/Immediate Needs



Specifically, the subgroup will:

- Gather input on same from statewide ESF teams (ESF 6, "Mass Care," and ESF 8, Public Health, in particular);
- Gather input on unmet recovery and immediate needs from the communities;
- Consolidate and prioritize the catalogue of unmet needs, potentially bundling like needs across regions;
- Ensure that neither existing state/federal or new FEMA resources are available to respond to the unmet need;
- Work together with philanthropic partners to identify sources of support to meet the need.



<u>Emergency Support Functions (ESF) 14</u> Subgroup on Recovery/Immediate Needs



Subgroup will draw on the insights of a broad range of partners whose perspectives are needed for the success of this effort:

- State government leadership, including through emergency management effort, and Office of Policy and Management (Governor's budget office)
- Nonprofit providers
- Leaders in philanthropy
- Regional emergency management/long-term recovery leaders and coordinators
